Years ago (1193-1998) when I was the Pastor of the Catholic Church of the Ascension in Hurricane, I took my turn as a volunteer Chaplin at Putnam General Hospital. One of my duties each day was to visit all newly admitted patients to see if they would welcome a visit and some prayer. I would also ask if the patient would like me to contact their minister to let him or her know.

One day I came to open door of a 40 year old man and knocked. He was talking to someone on the phone when he looked up and saw me dressed in clerical clothing. Without missing a beat, he told the caller, "I must be sicker than I thought. They sent for the Catholic priest to see me." The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick was once known as *Extreme Unction* - final anointing - and associated with preparing for immanent death. It is still wrongly called by some as *The Last Rites*.

The <u>ANOINTING</u> of the <u>SICK</u> is appropriate whenever one is hospitalized and preparing for or recovering from surgery. Someone who has a chronic condition such as diabetes or arthritis may also benefit. The Church teaches that anyone who is feeling the burden or weakness from old age may come for this sacramental blessing. Fr. Bill Petro, Fr. John Finnell, and I will be anointing the sick during the Saturday November 18 4pm Mass and the Sunday 11:30 am Mass. Please come to be anointed or pray for our sick brothers and sisters.

Another special event this week is our **BLESSED SACRAMENT THANKS**-**GIVING DAY CELEBRATION** with Mass at 1pm and dinner at 2pm. It is good to give thanks to the Lord and enjoy faith, food, fellowship, and fun. There is still time to sign up. Feel free to bring some side dishes or dessert. There will be a children's play area.

Finally, please pray for our pilgrims to the **National Catholic Youth Conference** in Indianapolis Thursday through Sunday. NCYC is a powerfully unique three-day experience of prayer, community, evangelization, catechesis, service, and empowerment for Catholic teenagers (of high school age) and their adult chaperones.
