Youth Music Ensemble is BACK!



Book Study: <u>Appalachian Pastoral Letters</u> - Donna Becher will help us explore two Letters by the Bishops of Appalachia celebrating the Catholic Church's contribution and call to action to be a light amidst so much darkness.

November 18 & 19

THE SACRAMENT of the ANOINTING of the SICK is a Sacrament of the Catholic Church which celebrates our faith in the healing touch of Christ in our lives. Jesus had deep compassion for those who were sick and the Church continues his healing mission today: "Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the Church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven." (James 5:14-15)

In the Sacrament, we pray that the sick person be healed in body, mind, and spirit. The Sacrament offers forgiveness and healing. God alone knows what kind of healing is most needed for us: that our anxieties are eased, that a wound be healed, that our fears turn to hope, that loneliness be embraced, that confusion turn to insight. The Sacrament may also help the sick person and their loved ones understand and experience suffering differently.

This Sacrament is not just for those who are at the point of death. People suffering under the burdens of age may be anointed. It is meant for anyone who is suffering from a serious illness: physical, emotional, mental or spiritual. The Sacrament may be received at any time during a person's illness, especially before surgery or treatment. Sacraments are for the living. Anointing of the Sick is a Sacrament of the Church. Therefore, it is preferable, as far as possible, to celebrate the rite when others can be present in the home, at the hospital, and in church.

Blessed Sacrament Parish will be having a communal on the way to the sick during the 4 PM mass on Saturday, November 18 and the 11:30 am Mass on Sunday November 19.

The deadline to become Virtus certified is November 30.

We need you!

Please take time to do this now.

After November 30, you must suspend your volunteer activities until this requirement is met.

Again: We need you! See the instructions on the next page on becoming certified

Virtus Certification has two parts:

- A background check every 3 years.
- Training to help you guard our children. This includes learning how a predator grooms his/her prey; the signs of depression in children; the code of conduct for all adult volunteers in our diocese; how to report suspicious activity, etc.

We ALL need to know these things (not just our volunteers).

You can become Virtus certified in several ways:

- If you do not have an online Virtus account: follow the instructions in Handout 1 to make an online account and take the steps needed for certification.
- If you have an online Virtus account: follow the instructions in Handout 2 to bring your certification up-to-date.
- All: Attend an in-person training session 1.5 hours (at most) of your time
- If you would like to do everything online, but do not have a computer, or would like help while you do it, sign up for an appointment to work with one of our staff members in our office on one of our computers.

Suggestion Box - 11/05/2023

Suggestion: Ushers should remind gift bearers to wait for the cross bearer before leaving the front of the altar after bringing the gifts up!!! Shows respect and unity.

Fr. Paul's Response: It is too much to ask the ushers/greeters to give special instructions to each gift bearer at each Mass, in addition to their other ushering/greeting duties.

Instead, I have been chatting with the gift bearers while waiting for the cross bearer to return to the front of the altar. This has been working well except when the cross bearer exits after returning the cross and does not return to the front of the altar.

Suggestion: Please close the sliding brown doors before Mass. Less distractions.

Fr. Paul's Response: I couldn't agree more. It was only the talk of increasing cases of Covid that caused us to delay closing these doors until after Christmas. Once we do, the doors will remain closed until Easter Sunday.

<u>Suggestion:</u> To receive Communion from the priest. Communion seems less "important"/sacred when received from other church members.

Fr. Paul's Response: In those days when Christians were being put to death for their faith, the Church debated and discussed, determined, and declared that the sanctity and efficacy of the sacrament did not depend upon the holiness of the priest or deacon. Holy Communion received from the hand of a priest is no different than Holy Communion received from the hands of a lay person other than it may seem "less important" to some. I have certain physical limitations that make my life difficult. When I stand in place too long on a hard floor, my knees lock up.


Saint of the Week

SAINT OF THE WEEK:

Saint Charles Borromeo

November 4

Many years ago, Charles Borromeo helped the Church begin to live the Gospels again. He did this by living simply. Charles was born in a castle in Italy on October 2, 1538. His rich parents gave Charles a fine education. With it and with their money, he could have been or done anything! But he said goodbye to his family's money. He knew at the age of 12 he wanted to become a priest.



Then, when sickness came to Milan in the form of the bubonic plague, Charles rushed from house to house. He fed the hungry; he bathed the sores of the sick; he buried the dead. He put the good news of God's love into action. Finally, in 1584, Charles himself got sick and died. He was only 46 years old. He had spent his life showing people what God's love looks like. So in 1610, the Church said, "Yes! Charles Borromeo is a saint! He lived the Gospels!" He was canonized just 26 years after his death.


