We will have a Spring food drive for the needy starting next weekend. Crackers and soup, bags of rice and beans, boxes of cereal and cans of meat, peanut butter, etc. All the things you have so generously donated in the past. Please bring your donations to the walkway between the gathering area and the parish hall.

Upcoming Flooring Project

What is it? We will have asbestos floor tiles removed and replaced with new flooring.

Where? The first and second floors of the original school building.

Why? Asbestos is a health hazard.

Yes, I know, but why now?

The initial project was to replace the carpet in the first floor hallway. Since removal of the carpet could break the floor tiles underneath it, the tiles were tested for and found to contain asbestos. These tiles were used throughout the school building.

After consultation with John Reardon, Director of Buildings and Property for our Diocese, Finance Council recommended we remove the asbestos now rather than later. None of us wanted people in the future regretting that we didn't take care of this when we could.

How will we pay for it?

The total cost will be about \$80,000. Our parish has applied for a 50% matching grant from our Diocese. (Some may remember the Diocese gave us a matching grant of \$15,000 to replace two HVAC units last year.) Also, we have funds that were set aside in prior years for capital projects like this.

Who was involved in the decision-making process?

Parish Staff, Finance Council, Pastoral Council, and several parishioners who had helpful experience and wisdom to share.

When? Late July through mid-September. Packing up will be in earnest beginning July 1.

What kind of inconveniences will there be?

An awful lot! That's why we're doing this in the summer when things slow down activity-wise.

Our meeting rooms and office cannot be used during this project. Neither can our gym and parish hall as they will be storage areas for all the stuff moved from the office and meeting rooms.


The south entrance will be closed for most of the project. We will ask the more able-bodied to park in the south parking lot and walk around to our north entrance for Mass.

We will have a temporary office set up in the community room, near the parish hall.

How can we help?

Be patient and kind with each other. Everyone will be inconvenienced by this.

Prayers for the safety of the workers and the sanity of our staff are welcome, and oatmeal raisin cookies.



Saint Gemma Galgani was canonized not for her ecstasies, the stigmata she bore or for her prophecies. She was canonized for her virtue. . . Although the ridicule and accusations hurt Gemma, she never complained or retaliated. Instead, she forgave those who hurt her and prayed for them. . .

Gemma was born on March 12, 1878 in the region of Tuscany, Italy. She was the fourth of eight children, and the oldest daughter. . . Gemma was so devout and intelligent, it was decided she should be Confirmed at age 7. . . . She received First Holy Communion at age 9, years earlier than was customary at the time. The priest at the school said he was afraid she would die from longing if he didn't let her receive. She received her First Communion on the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. . . In 1897, her father lost everything. All of his

property and income were seized because of poor business decisions. He died penniless that same year. With no inheritance to help them, Gemma and her younger siblings were taken in by relatives. . .

She returned to Lucca to live with another family and became seriously ill. Her spine became curved and inflamed. She had lesions on her scalp and lost her hair. She suffered in agony for more than a year. She had visions of St. Gabriel Possenti (who at the time was not yet beatified), Jesus, Mary, and the devil. She endured surgery without chloroform on tumors on her spine and head. Then on Feb. 23, 1899, St. Gabriel told her in a vision that if she wanted to recover, she needed to pray a novena to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The Novena ended on March 3, the first Friday of the month. She confessed her sins, received Holy Communion, and was healed.

Gemma believed her healing was a sign to enter religious life, but none of the communities would receive her, fearing that she would become sick again. Gemma refused to become embittered about not being able to realize her lifelong dream. She surrendered her plans to Jesus and became content with a domestic life with relatives. . .

Gemma continued her intense prayer life, suffered manifestations of Christ's Passion, and served the poor as much as her health would allow. In 1903, she became sick with tuberculosis and died on April 11. Because of her love for the Passionists and their love for her, the Sisters of the Passionists gave the family a habit for her for her burial. In testimonies for her beatification, witnesses said that no one could tell by being with her that Gemma suffered so much. They said she was joyful and truly beautiful with a graceful, peaceful presence.

Efforts continue across the Mountain State after the severe flooding that occurred earlier this month. West Virginia encountered tornados, microbursts, strong winds, heavy rains, and mudslides. Several counties have experienced moderate-to-substantial flooding, notably along the Ohio River and its tributaries. The National Weather Service has confirmed 5 tornadoes in West Virginia – Huntington (Cabell/Wayne), St, Albans (Kanawha), Cross Lanes (Kanawha), Quick (Kanawha) and Lavista (Fayette). A State of Emergency has been declared in 17 West Virginia Counties.

Most Rev. Mark Brennan, Bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, has approved a special collection to be held the weekend of April 20-21, 2024, in all parishes and missions throughout the diocese to support recovery efforts related to the series of disasters that have occurred. Checks should be made out to your respective parish with "Disaster Relief" on the memo line.

Proceeds from this collection will support the long-term humanitarian and recovery efforts of Catholic Charities West Virginia. Their offices assist families long after other organizations have moved out. The role of Catholic Charities will last months and years as they help families and individuals in the rebuilding process to restore safe, secure, and sanitary living conditions. All of the money raised will stay in West Virginia to assist our neighbors.

Please remember in prayer all those whose lives have been changed in the wake of these disasters. Let us come together now to support our brothers and sisters in Christ who have been injured and lost their homes, cars, employment, and access to food and water.


