



*Next weekend we will share our idea for ads to help us cover the publishing cost of the directories. We will also have a packet of information for each of our parish households.


This packet will contain:

SAINT OF THE WEEK:

Saint Anselm of Canterbury April 21

Saint Anselm of Canterbury was a remarkable figure in medieval Christian theology and philosophy, known for his adherence to the monastic lifestyle and his willingness to stand up against powerful politicians. He was also a passionate advocate for the poor, speaking out against the slave trade and dedicating much of his life to helping those in need.

In addition to his advocacy work, Anselm was also a prolific writer, producing many influential works on the existence and nature of God. His most famous contribution to philosophy is his ontological argument for the existence of God, which continues to be debated and studied by scholars today. He also tackled the problem of evil, arguing that it is not a positive reality but rather the absence of good, and that it is the result of human free will.

In addition to his philosophical work, Anselm also made significant contributions to theology. He is particularly known for his work on the doctrine of the atonement. He believed that human beings owed a debt to God because of their sin, and that this debt could only be paid through the sacrifice of Jesus Christ. While walking alone in the darkness of night I saw beaming down a beautiful light It lighted the pathway so I could see It felt like someone was beckoning me


It led me to pastures so fertile and green The most welcoming sight I had ever seen Sheepherders sitting so solemn and still With sheep that were grazing all over the hill

STORY

May years ago, one of England's leading actors was asked to recite for the pleasure of his fellow guests. He consented and asked if there was anything special that his audience would like to hear. After a moment's pause, an old clergyman present said: "Could you, sir, recite to us the Twenty-third Psalm?" A strange look passed over the actor's face; he paused for a moment, and then said: "I can, and I will, upon one condition; and that is that after I have recited it, you, my friend, will do the same." "I?" said the clergyman, in surprise. "But I am not an elocutionist. However, if you wish it, I will do so."

Impressively, the great actor began the psalm. His voice and his intonation were perfect. He held his audience spellbound; and as he finished, a great burst of applause broke from the guests. Then, as it died away, the old clergyman arose and began the psalm. His voice was not remarkable; his intonation was not faultless. When he had finished, no sound of applause broke the silence—but there was not a dry eye in the room, and many heads were bowed.

Then the actor rose to his feet again. His voice shook as he laid his hand upon the shoulder of the old clergyman and said: "I reached your eyes and ears, my friends; he reached your hearts. The difference is just this—I know the Twenty-third Psalm, but he knows the Shepherd."



Efforts continue across the Mountain State after the severe flooding that occurred earlier this month. West Virginia encountered tornados, microbursts, strong winds, heavy rains, and mudslides. Several counties have experienced moderate-to-substantial flooding, notably along the Ohio River and its tributaries. The National Weather Service has confirmed 5 tornadoes in West Virginia – Huntington (Cabell/Wayne), St, Albans (Kanawha), Cross Lanes (Kanawha), Quick (Kanawha) and Lavista (Fayette). A State of Emergency has been declared in 17 West Virginia Counties.

Most Rev. Mark Brennan, Bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, has approved a special collection to be held the weekend of April 20-21, 2024, in all parishes and missions throughout the diocese to support recovery efforts related to the series of disasters that have occurred. Checks should be made

out to your respective parish with "Disaster Relief" on the memo line. Donations can also be made on the diocesan website at https://dwc.org/disaster-relief/.

Proceeds from this collection will support the long-term humanitarian and recovery efforts of Catholic Charities West Virginia. Their offices assist families long after other organizations have moved out. The role of Catholic Charities will last months and years as they help families and individuals in the rebuilding process to restore safe, secure, and sanitary living conditions. All of the money raised will stay in West Virginia to assist our neighbors.

Please remember in prayer all those whose lives have been changed in the wake of these disasters. Let us come together now to support our brothers and sisters in Christ who have been injured and lost their homes, cars, employment, and access to food and water.
