
May God's blessings be upon him and us as we seek to do God's will.

Weekly Email from Father Paul Wharton

When in his youth he was asked which he preferred, Martin Buber thought he preferred books to people. Books are easy to handle, easy to open and to close, to remove or place back on the shelves. Books are manna from heaven, while humans are like hard, brown bread on whose crust he breaks his teeth. But as he grew older, Buber changed his mind. "I knew nothing of books when I came forth from the womb of my mother, and I shall die without books; I shall die with another human hand in my own."

These thoughts came to mind as I considered this week's email. My second biggest regret in the past twelve months was the brouhaha or controversy created by a committee of parishioners and staff to design a new logo. Most parishioners didn't realize there already was an unofficial official logo. Few of them knew where it was from or what it meant. People were given the opportunity to weigh in. Check the bulletin for the results and comments.

What makes Blessed Sacrament Parish what it is are those connections we have with one another through our Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Spirit. When we pray together, play together, learn together, minister together, we are Blessed Sacrament Parish. When we support, encourage, appreciate one another, and carry on the work and mission of the Church in the world we are most the Body of Christ. Priests, logos, and even buildings come and go, but... GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The two disciples had every reason and opportunity to see that it was Jesus walking beside them. They knew that the tomb was empty and the women who had discovered it had relayed what the angel had told them: Jesus was alive. It had only been three days since he had died. Yet, even as he was in their midst, the two disciples' eyes were prevented from recognizing it was Jesus. Only when he broke bread with them did they perceive and understand. Jesus walks beside us as well, but perhaps our eyes, like those of the two disciples, are prevented from recognizing him. What clouds our vision? It could be fear, doubt, despair, as on that road to Emmaus. Or maybe it is pride or hardness of heart. Like the early disciples, we must speak to Jesus, and tell him our story. Jesus comes to meet us, and we in turn have an opportunity to encounter him in many ways, most particularly in the breaking of the bread - the Eucharist. No matter how frantic or chaotic our lives may have become, attending Mass serves as an anchor, and a reminder of Jesus' presence with us every day.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It took them a minute to "get it," but once the disciples recognized Jesus they didn't hesitate. They made a hasty return to Jerusalem to share the news with the other disciples: "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!" Having encountered Jesus in the breaking of the bread, they felt compelled to share the Good News of his resurrection with others. As Catholics, we can ask the Lord for eyes to see Jesus in our daily lives and especially at Mass. Nourished by the Eucharist, we can share our love for Jesus and our hope in the resurrection with others we encounter. Wherever we are and whatever we do, we can rest assured that Jesus walks alongside us.



Spiritual Icebreakers and Soup Starters 42

Icebreakers give us something to talk about. Soup starters make for a good start. Here is some spiritual kindling to use, think about, and pray with this week.

STORY A frequently told story that may or may noted have happened has a good and truth-filled message. Philip was an eleven year old Down syndrome child who was in a Sunday School class with eight other children. Easter Sunday the teacher brought an empty plastic egg for each child. They were told to go out of the church building onto the grounds and put into the egg something that would remind them of the meaning of Easter. All returned joyfully. As each egg was opened there were exclamations of delight at a butterfly, a twig, a flower, a blade of grass, then the last egg was opened. It was Philip's and it was empty! Some of the children made fun of Philip. "But, teacher," he said, "teacher, the tomb was empty." A newspaper article announcing Philip's death a few months later noted that at the conclusion of the funeral eight children marched forward and put a large empty egg on the small casket. On it was a banner that said, "The tomb was empty."

One night as I lay sleeping a petal from a beautiful flower opened up and invited me in and I drifted into the sweet nectar.


