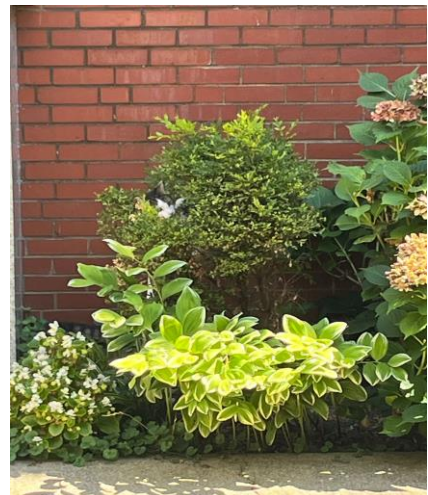

SAINT OF THE WEEK :

Saint Augustine

August 28

St. Augustine was born in 354. He lived a loose and lazy life early on. It was through the prayers, fasting and alms giving of his mother, St. Monica, that he was eventually converted to Christianity, and baptized. In the summer of 386, in reading the life of St. Anthony of the Desert, he was greatly inspired. He went through a profound crisis leading him to convert to the Catholic Faith, abandoned his career of teaching in Milan, gave up his idea of marriage, and devoted himself entirely to serving God and to the practices of priesthood, including celibacy. According to

Augustine, his conversion was prompted by a “Childlike voice” he heard telling him in a singsong voice, “take up and read”.

Augustine sold his patrimony and gave the money to the poor. The only thing he kept was the family house, which he converted into a monastic foundation for himself and a group of friends. In 391, he was ordained a Priest in Hippo Regius, now Algeria. He became a famous preacher and theologian. There are more than 350 of his sermons preserved to date and are believed to be authentic. In 395, he was made Bishop of Hippo. He remained in this position until his death in 430.

Sometimes the life “we” choose for ourselves, is not always the life that God chooses for us. The life of St. Augustine is a great example of that. He spent his youth in a carefree style, and paid little attention to God or Christianity. It was through his studies, and the constant prayers of his mother, St. Monica, that he had a profound conversion. He went on to be baptized, ordained a Priest, and elected Bishop of Hippo. He spent his life serving God, building up the Church, and converting the people in his care. What more can one do, but to search for God in many areas, finding Him, and then dedicating one’s life to serve Him? St. Augustine’s life and example lays that out, and how to overcome the struggles that we still face today. One would be wise to study his life, follow his example, and then call upon him when we need assistance.

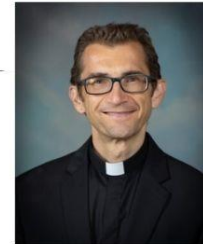

Two five-week courses are being offered through the University of Dayton's Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation

They are composed of both weekly live two-hour zoom lectures as well as a rich variety of online course materials and discussion experiences through the University of Dayton's Virtual Learning Community For Faith Formation (VLCFF). The courses are being underwritten by the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston's Office of Evangelization & Catechesis, who pays 100% of the tuition and the cost of any books associated with the courses. ### Sacraments

This is an introductory overview to the theology of the sacraments, the public, liturgical prayer of the Church. The Church is never so much the Church as when it is gathered together for liturgy. Jesus Himself is Sacrament, the visible sign of the invisible God. Eucharist is THE sacrament for it contains all that we are, all that the Church is, and all that Jesus says of God. Each of the sacraments will be discussed within the context of its role in the lives of the faithful: initiation into God's life, healing and reconciliation, and service to God's community. In this course we will gain a deeper understanding of the liturgy, the power of symbols, the history of the sacraments including baptism and the OCIA. We will study the Eucharist as source and Summit of ecclesial life and be able to explain the Sacraments of Initiation, Healing and Vocation. This course will include online materials and a two-hour weekly zoom meeting on Wednesday evenings 7-9 pm beginning September 4<sup>th</sup>. ### Faith Formation:

### Study of The Joy of the Gospel: *Evangelii Gaudium*

Pope Francis has a dream of a Church walking without hesitation on a path of pastoral and missionary conversion with a joyful attitude that is personal and communal. This joy will transform habits, language, and facilities, directing them towards evangelization rather than self-preservation. (EG#27, 192) This dream is the focus of his Apostolic Exhortation, *The Joy of the Gospel*, which is the fruit of the October 2012 Synod of Bishops on The New Evangelization for the Transmission of the Faith. Though spurred by the recommendations of the Synod Fathers, the Pope's intentions go beyond it. There is a sense of newness in *The Joy of the Gospel* that radiates from the document's originality, style, and character. Pope Francis writes, "I invite all Christians, everywhere, at this very moment, to a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ, or at least an openness to letting him encounter them." (EG#3) The Pope encourages the Christian faithful to embark upon a new chapter of evangelization marked by a joy ever new, a joy which is shared.

As part of our studies, we will look at this Exhortation as it relates to other Church documents, look at the meaning of "New Evangelization" and what it means to be "mission oriented." Of special interest this Fall, in light of the next Synod session, we will discuss the role and responsibility of the laity in the Church under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit and look at what it means to be "Spirit-filled evangelizers" today. The course materials are online and there is a two-hour weekly class discussion on Monday evenings from 7-9 pm beginning Sept 2. # 5 Keys to Monitoring Kids Online Activity

Technology is here to stay. Not only is it here to stay, it's everywhere! Televisions, mobile phones, iPads, interactive video games, smart watches, you name it and it's hooked up online.

The following are five starting points for guiding kids to use the internet and technology safely and well. Each family may come up with their own limits around technology use, but every family should think through how they want to approach these areas of monitoring online activity.

**Use Protective Software:** One of the most foundational things you can do to manage what your kids access online is accountability and filter software on all of your online devices. Systems like Covenant Eyes, Bark Home Web Filter, Circle, and options on your router or with your internet provider can help you not only limit what sites and apps kids access and when, but also allow you to see their online activity.

**Share Passwords and "Friend" or follow Your Kids' Accounts:** Many parents establish some ground rules when their kids are old enough to have their own email and social media accounts. These rules may include friending or following them so that you see what's happening on their pages and/or sharing passwords—though it's important to know that many platforms allow them to block some people from seeing everything. Other rules can include only connecting with people they know in real life and not sharing any personal information such as address, phone number, email, or banking information. You can go through their accounts with them to ensure they are as safe as possible.

**Discuss Photo/Video Sharing:** Photo/video sharing should only be done with people they know in real life. Let them know any images they choose to share remain online permanently, and that once they share a photo or video, they can't get it back. If anyone ever asks them to send photos or videos of a sexual nature, they should immediately inform a safe adult.

**Keep Online Activity Visible:** Consider only having your kids use technology in public spaces in the house. This can help reinforce the message that they should not be accessing anything inappropriate and also make it easy for them to talk to you if they encounter anything questionable. Another option to consider is to remove access to electronic devices during bedtime hours. However, keep in mind that children may take electronic devices with them, or may use technology in places apart from your home, which means that regular conversations are important!

**Regularly Talk about Online Activity:** It can be easy for adults and kids to become isolated in their online activity; it can easily become their own world, separate from the family. Make technology use part of your dinner table conversation—did they hear from any friends today? Read an interesting article? See something new they want to watch? Like any other area of their lives, technology is a sphere where you can provide invaluable guidance and feedback.

As we know from our own lives as adults in the digital era, the internet has a lot to offer. It also has a number of risks, including safety, online addictions, wasting time, and more. We have the opportunity to help guide our kids how to use the internet safely and well!
