Chances are if you walk into a church with lots of candles ablaze or waiting to be lit, it is a Roman Catholic Church. Why candles? Jesus is the Light of the World who came to overcome the darkness of sin and power of death. People light devotional candles as a symbol of a desire to stay and pray for a particular intention. Where the Easter Vigil is celebrated at night, the fire spreads from the Easter Candle to everyone gathered.

A story is about a grandmother struggling with a life-threatening illness. One granddaughter was watching her as she lit a candle and placed it in the window. "Grandma," the little girl asked, "why do you light so many candles?" She answered. "It's to tell darkness we beg to differ."

We hear these joyful words spoken during the Christmas Mass at Night. "*The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone.You have brought them abundant joy and great rejoicing.*" The people and staff of Blessed Sacrament invite you to join us in a joyful celebration of CHRIST's MASs on Dec.24 at 4pm, 7pm, Midnight, and at 10am on Christmas morning.

MYSTICAL MUSINGS:

In last Sunday's gospel we heard that while imprisoned John the Baptist was having doubts about whether or not Jesus was the Messiah. Pope Francis spoke about this prior to the Angelus when he said this about DOUBT. "... sometimes it is essential for spiritual growth: it helps us understand that God is always greater than we imagine Him to be. His works are surprising compared to our calculations; His actions are different, always, they exceed our needs and expectations; and therefore, we must never stop seeking Him and converting to His true face. A great theologian used to say that God "needs to be rediscovered in stages... sometimes believing that we are losing Him" (H. DE LUBAC, *Sur les chemins de Dieu*). This is what the Baptist does: in doubt, he still seeks Him, questions Him, "argues" with Him and finally rediscovers Him." [link:
