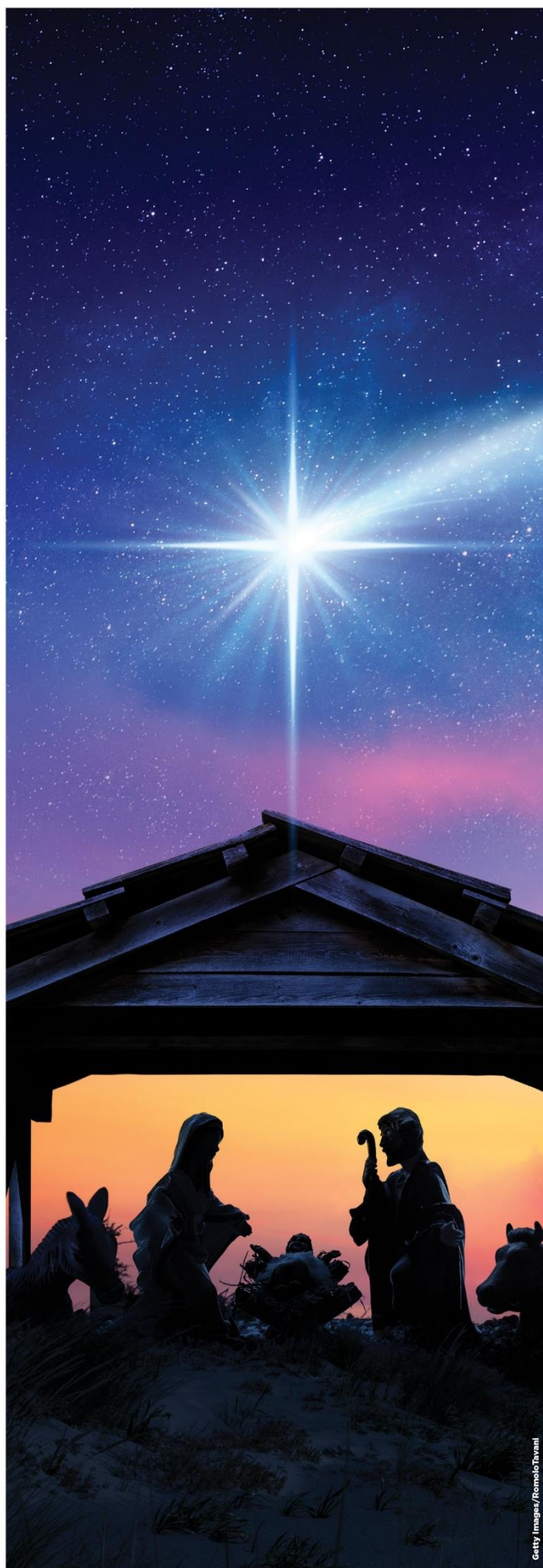

The day we have been awaiting has arrived: Christ is born! All of our Christmas preparations – wrapping gifts and preparing holiday meals to be shared among family and friends – are meant to glorify and reflect God’s own work for and in us. That is, God’s greatest gift of himself, clothed in mortal flesh, who would one day offer himself as the bread of life: “The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us.” Jesus came to the world in the form of the most helpless of us all, a newborn infant, so that through him we would be reconciled to the Father, for “to those who did accept him he gave power to become children of God.” We celebrate the Incarnation of the Lord, for Christ is our salvation! It is through Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit that we are adopted into God’s family and receive the fullness of his grace. The fullness of God’s truth is revealed in Jesus Christ. “The Lord has made his salvation known”; “he has spoken to us through the Son.” Let us give thanks and rejoice this day!

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The Good News of Jesus Christ is not meant to be kept to ourselves. Today’s Gospel reading reminds us that John the Baptist testified to the light of Christ before Christ had yet publicly appeared. Sharing the Good News is not optional! Even the earth proclaims the Good News in Isaiah, “announcing salvation, and saying to Zion, ‘Your God is King!’” Indeed, Christ the King – God in human flesh – has arrived. Just as John was sent before the Lord to proclaim his coming, so are we charged: Sent out to the world to go and announce the Gospel of the Lord, “so that all might believe.”

WITNESS How might you go out and proclaim the coming of the Lord? Don’t forget: sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ isn’t limited just to speaking to others. It includes *living* as Christ did – feeding the hungry, caring for the sick and the poor, defending the helpless – because we are Christ’s body in the world.

More Items of Interest

Creation Care Reflection: Fourth Sunday of Advent, Dec. 25, 2022

The messages of the readings for the three masses on Christmas might be gathered together under two major themes: God coming to us in human flesh, thus being a genuine part of creation; and the restoration of the people. Each of the first readings is taken from Isaiah. The first proclaims the birth of a royal son who will rule the people in peace. The second identifies that king as the savior of his people. The third states that God will work through that king to restore a broken nation.

As we gaze at the manger scene, do we recognize him? Are we open to hear his teaching? Are we ready to allow him to transform us and the world of which we are a part? When it comes to caring for creation, are we prepared, as Mary and Joseph were, to do whatever is necessary to help fulfill the Lord's plan, and "eager to do what is good"?

† Passage from Laudato Si':

Grace...found unsurpassable expression when God himself became man and gave himself as food for his creatures. The Lord, in the culmination of the mystery of the Incarnation, chose to reach our intimate depths through a fragment of matter. He comes not from above, but from within, he comes that we might find him in this world of ours. (236)

Prayer:

May the transformation for which we pray will embrace the entire created world, let us pray to the Lord.

What is our Pastoral Council?

Our Pastoral Council is the body of parishioners who are responsible to keep the whole parish community focused on the Mission, the Goals and the Objectives that we have discerned to be God's will for us. They are the primary body that advises and works with the pastor and staff about the well-being of the parish community as it strives to carry out its Mission. All parishioners of all ages are eligible to serve on the council and to recommend new members.

How is the Council structured?

The Council strives for consensus on questions that are posed rather than majority vote. Consensus means a result that all members can live with, even if it is not our strongest preference. Council members serve a 4-year term. The Council usually meets the second Monday of each month at 7pm.

There is no limit to the number of terms that members can serve. There is also no limit to the number of parishioners who can serve on the Council.

Traditionally, the first meeting of the new Council Session will be in January. However, the retirement of our Pastor, Deacon, and Pastoral Associate and the breaking in of our new Pastor has thrown us off this timeline.

How does one recommend new members for the Pastoral Council?

Pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit for yourself and for all parishioners. Every parishioner may recommend as many people as they wish. Any parishioner may also recommend him/herself. There will be an ample supply of blank recommendation forms in the gathering space after each Mass for the next 3 weeks.

Those who are recommended will be invited to attend our next meeting and a time of prayerful discernment.

Why and How to Have Mass Offered for One's Intention

Offering Mass for a special intention is a long-standing tradition in the Catholic Church. Special graces are obtained for whom or what intention the Mass is said. Masses are offered for many reasons — the souls in purgatory, remembrance for someone who is deceased, healing of one who is sick, thanksgiving, in honor of a birthday or anniversary, a worthy or special intention such as peace in the world, etc. The intention is for whom or what the priest is praying as he celebrates Mass. Whenever and wherever the Eucharist is celebrated, the Church shares in the graces of Jesus' death and resurrection.

Because there are more requests for Mass Intentions that can be fulfilled in a year, we are implementing a new policy for scheduling.

1. All Mass intentions need to be scheduled with Natalie at the parish office.
2. Mass Intentions are only scheduled one year at a time, namely the First Sunday of Advent through the Solemnity of Christ the King.
3. To ensure that the recently deceased may be remembered at a Sunday (or Saturday night) Mass or weekday Mass in a timely fashion, some dates will not be assigned an intention until a few weeks ahead of time.
4. The scheduled dates are subject to change if the Mass schedule changes.

Mass Intentions are filled on a first come first served basis. Certain dates are excluded. Some days there will be no Mass or Mass may be postponed. If so, it will be rescheduled. The suggested offering is \$10.00 per Daily Mass intention, and \$20.00 per Sunday Mass intention. Requests with no offerings are welcome and will be accepted. Mass Intentions are published in the Bulletin.

If we want to celebrate Christmas authentically, we need to contemplate this sign: the frail simplicity of a tiny newborn child, the meekness with which he is placed in a manger, the tender affection with which he is wrapped in his swaddling clothes. That is where God is. With this sign, the Gospel reveals a paradox. It speaks of the emperor, the governor, the high and mighty of those times, yet God does not make himself present there. He appears not in the splendor of a royal palace, but in the poverty of a stable; not in pomp and show, but in simplicity of life; not in power, but in astonishing smallness. In order to meet him, we need to go where he is. We need to bow down, to humble ourselves, to make ourselves small. The newborn Child challenges us. He calls us to leave behind fleeting illusions and to turn to what is essential, to renounce our insatiable cravings, to abandon our endless yearning for things we will never have. We do well to leave such things behind, in order to discover, in the simplicity of the divine Child, peace, joy and the luminous meaning of life. (Pope Francis (1936-))
