

# Weekly Email from Father Paul Wharton

February 4, 2023

On a rocky seacoast where shipwrecks were frequent, there was a ramshackle little lifesaving station. It was no more than a hut and only one boat. But the few people who staffed the station were absolutely devoted and kept constant watch. If there was any evidence of a shipwreck, they would fearlessly risk their lives to save others. Many lives were thus saved and the station became famous.

As the fame of the life-saving station grew. so did the desire of people in the neighborhood to become associated with its excellent work. They offered their time and money -- so new boats were bought, and new crews were trained. The hut, too, was replaced by a large, comfortable building for those who staffed the station &for the victims of shipwrecks who were saved.

Since shipwrecks did not happen every day and it was such a fine building with such a beautiful view. The lifesaving station became a popular gathering place. As time passed, the members became so interested in socializing that they had little interest in saving lives. As a matter of fact, when some people were actually rescued from the sea, it was nuisance because they were always dirty and sick and stained the carpet and furniture. Soon the social activities became so numerous that they sold the boats in order to make room for everyone who wanted to join. If you happen to visit that area today you will find a beautiful, but exclusive club, proud of its origin and tradition. Shipwrecks still happen, but nobody seems to care much.

This sometimes happens to churches and congregations. To try to keep that from happening, the Church sets before us readings from the Bible to remind us of what we are supposed to be about. At the heart of discipleship is this reality -- each of us is called to make a difference. We Christians are called to be the salt of the earth. In Jesus 'day salt was used to preserve, to flavor, to heal. It is as if Jesus is saying, "How ridiculous, if you think you can love me and not make a difference in the lives of people around you." We Christians are to be light to the world, a light that shines boldly. If is as if Jesus is saying, "How ridiculous, if you think you can love me and not have that love shine forth for others to see."
