
Call to Worship for Epiphany



What is our Pastoral Council?

Our Pastoral Council is the body of parishioners who are responsible to keep the whole parish community focused on the Mission, the Goals and the Objectives that we have discerned to be God's will for us. They are the primary body that advises and works with the pastor and staff about the well-being of the parish community as it strives to carry out its Mission. All parishioners of all ages are eligible to serve on the council and to recommend new members.

How is the Council structured?

The Council strives for consensus on questions that are posed rather than majority vote. Consensus means a result that all members can live with, even if it is not our strongest preference. Council members serve a 4-year term. The Council usually meets the second Monday of each month at 7pm.

There is no limit to the number of terms that members can serve. There is also no limit to the number of parishioners who can serve on the Council.

Traditionally, the first meeting of the new Council Session will be in January. However, the retirement of our Pastor, Deacon, and Pastoral Associate and the breaking in of our new Pastor has thrown us off this timeline.

How does one recommend new members for the Pastoral Council?

Pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit for yourself and for all parishioners. Every parishioner may recommend as many people as they wish. Any parishioner may also recommend him/herself. There will be an ample supply of blank recommendation forms in the gathering space after each Mass for the next 3 weeks.


Those who are recommended will be invited to attend our next meeting and a time of prayerful discernment.

The Epiphany of the Lord

Is 60:1-6 | Eph 3:2-3a, 5-6 | Mt 2:1-12

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

It's easy to stay inside and cozy up on the couch these winter months. Having just gotten through the winter solstice, many of us crave light and warmth. The language of Isaiah may resonate with us even more deeply this time of year: "See, darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds cover the peoples; but upon you the Lord shines, and over you appears his glory." In today's Gospel, in the dark of night, the Magi follow a bright star to pay homage to Jesus, whom they recognize as the newborn king of the Jews. On the Epiphany, which means "manifestation," we celebrate this moment when Christ's light shone forth to the world. As Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI wrote in Jesus of Nazareth: The Infancy Narratives: "The key point is this: The wise men from the east are a new beginning. They represent the journeying of humanity toward Christ."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Like the Wise Men who traveled a long distance to pay homage to the Christ Child, each of us journeys every day toward a fuller life in Christ. Just as the Magi followed the light to discover Christ, so does the light of Christ serve as our constant beacon, reorienting us toward God and his holy path. After worshiping the Christ Child at Christmas, let us move forward and pay homage to the Savior through our words and actions. Although Epiphany signifies the official "end" of the Christmas season, it is fitting that it falls at the beginning of a new calendar year because it allows us to reexamine, among our traditional "New Year's resolutions," how we live our lives in the light of Christ. "The wise men from the east are a new beginning,' the pope said. May their journey and experience inspire us to "begin anew" however we must, and offer Jesus our gifts of love and devotion, considering how his light may shine through us to others.

PRAY "Dear Jesus, as you led the Wise Men to you by the light of a star, please draw us ever closer to you by the light of faith. Help us to desire you as ardently as they did. Give us the grace to overcome all the obstacles that keep us far from you. May we, like them, have something to give you when we appear before you. Amen."

Creation Care Recipe of the Month-January



Black Bean Soup

A simple, delicious weekday meal that can be served with crusty bread!

Ingredients

- 2 Tablespoons olive oil
- 1 onion, chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 green bell pepper, chopped
- 1 can diced tomatoes (or 1 large chopped tomato)
- 2 Tbs white or apple cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon each cumin, coriander and paprika
 - 3-4 bay leaves
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 6 cups black beans cooked
- 2 cups vegetable broth
- ¼ cup fresh chopped parsley

Instructions

- In a large stockpot over medium-high heat, sauté the onion, garlic, and bell pepper in the olive oil until the onion begins to soften, about 5 minutes.
- Add the tomato, vinegar, cumin, coriander, paprika, bay leaves, salt, and pepper and cook for another 5 minutes.
- Add the beans and broth and reduce to a simmer. Cook for about 15 minutes, covered.
- Top with parsley and serve immediately. Or try with cilantro. (6 servings)

Eating "lower on the food chain" is a powerful way to answer Pope Francis' call to Care for Creation.

Why? It can help reduce the amount of water, land, energy, chemicals, transportation, refrigeration and packaging we use. It can also help reduce stress on our livestock and its handlers, lower grocery bills, improve personal health, and keep us in solidarity with people with less means.

How to do it? Choose ingredients that are in-season, organic, locally grown, with simple or no packaging, and contain no meat and little dairy.

Praise Be to God for His generosity — the soil and water, plants and animals that sustain us, and for the farmers who labor. Bon appétit!

Why and How to Have Mass Offered for One's Intention

Offering Mass for a special intention is a long-standing tradition in the Catholic Church. Special graces are obtained for whom or what intention the Mass is said. Masses are offered for many reasons — the souls in purgatory, remembrance for someone who is deceased, healing of one who is sick, thanksgiving, in honor of a birthday or anniversary, a worthy or special intention such as peace in the world, etc. The intention is for whom or what the priest is praying as he celebrates Mass. Whenever and wherever the Eucharist is celebrated, the Church shares in the graces of Jesus' death and resurrection.

Because there are more requests for Mass Intentions that can be fulfilled in a year, we are implementing a new policy for scheduling.

- 1. All Mass intentions need to be scheduled with Natalie at the parish office.
- 2. Mass Intentions are only scheduled one year at a time, namely the First Sunday of Advent through the Solemnity of Christ the King.
- 3. To ensure that the recently deceased may be remembered at a Sunday (or Saturday night) Mass or weekday Mass in a timely fashion, some dates will not be assigned an intention until a few weeks ahead of time.
- 4. The scheduled dates are subject to change if the Mass schedule changes.

Mass Intentions are filled on a first come first served basis. Certain dates are excluded. Some days there will be no Mass or Mass may be postponed. If so, it will be rescheduled. The suggested offering is \$10.00 per Daily Mass intention, and \$20.00 per Sunday Mass intention. Requests with no offerings are welcome and will be accepted. Mass Intentions are published in the Bulletin.
