8 Things to Know about the Restoration of Communion from the Cup

- 1. Communion from the Cup will be available beginning on Holy Thursday.
- 2. As always, it is optional since whenever one receives either the consecrated bread or consecrated wine, one receives both the Body and the Blood of Jesus. The Church has said that doing so is a fuller sign, not a requirement nor a source of more grace.
- 3. When one approaches the Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion, one bows his or her head, responds by taking the chalice into one's hands, and saying "Amen" before taking a sip, and returning the chalice to the minister.
- 4. Out of charity and genuine love of neighbor, one who is coughing, sneezing, has a runny nose, is feverish, or is the least bit sick, ought never to receive communion from the cup or communion on the tongue.
- 5. Although the chalice is wiped after each communicant, there are no assurances that germs will not be transmitted. The alcohol does not guarantee this either.
- 6. Since the consecrated wine must be consumed afterwards, it is possible we will run out until we get a better idea of how much wine to use.
- 7. It is almost certain that we will need more help distributing communion. Please prayerfully consider volunteering.
- 8. Please complete the Survey Monkey poll on our website or on a table in the Gathering Space.

3 Things to Know about Exchanging the Sign of Peace.

- 1. Also, at your own discretion people may hug, kiss, one shake hands during the Sign of Peace. Peace is exchanged only with those close by.
- 2. Please read the Body Language of those around you. Some prefer not to physically exchange a sign with others. We need to respect that.
- 3. One doesn't move around trying to greet everyone everywhere as if this is essential. As has always been the case since its restoration some 60 + years ago, the exchange of this sign is both encouraged and entirely optional.

Holy Week 2023 at Blessed Sacrament

Holy Week is the most important time of the year for the Catholic Church. The entire reason for Lent is to prepare us to celebrate Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil as a community of faith. We celebrate the Paschal Mystery – the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ – in word and sacrament, in voice and silence, and in actions and symbols. Here is something of what to expect.

<u>Palm Sunday</u> is also known as <u>Passion Sunday</u> includes the blessing of palms and the reading of the Passion according to St. Matthew (this year). Mass will begin in the Parish Hall for those able to walk easily. It includes blessing of palms, reading of the first gospel, and a procession into the Church as we sing. The Passion includes multiple readers and parts for the congregation to say aloud. Be sure to burn or bring back any palms from past years. Saturday April 1 at 5:30 pm; Sunday April 2 at 9 & 11:30 am.

Holy Thursday (April 6 at 6:00 pm) is a commemoration of the Last Supper. We remember with awe the humility of Jesus in washing the feet of the apostles and His generosity in giving us the Sacrament of his Body and Blood that we call the Eucharist. The parish will be presented with holy oils blessed by Bishop Mark Brennan. These oils will be used in the sacrament of Baptism, Confirmation, & Anointing in the coming year.

The Liturgy on this night includes two other special ceremonies. The entirely optional ritual of Foot-washing has been done in a variety of ways through the years. This year (unless he is called in at the last minute to substitute somewhere else) Fr. John will wash the feet of 12 parishioners as did Jesus at the Last Supper. After communion and prayer, the priest, servers and choir will process through the church to the Chapel of Repose (which will be in the Hallway to the Parish Hall) and the Eucharist will be placed in a tabernacle. Everyone is invited to stop by and visit our Lord Jesus present in the Eucharist, to stay with him as did the disciples in the Garden of Gethsemane. Be sure to sign up for a time to be present and pray.


<u>Good Friday</u> is so named because it is not the funeral of Jesus. We believe and know that Jesus rose from the dead. Here are two opportunities for us to gather in faith. In the Stations of the Cross, we follow Jesus as he walks the Way of the Cross. In the Good Friday Liturgy, we listen to God's Word, pray solemn intercessions, venerate the Cross, and receive Holy Communion that was consecrated the night before. Stations begin at 3pm; Good Friday Liturgy at 6pm on April 7, 2023.





Fourth Sunday of Lent

1 Sm 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a | Eph 5:8-14 | Jn 9:1-41

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Five days, five minutes of sunshine: That's how the city where I live greeted 2023. As the month wore on, the gloom seemed unrelenting with only momentary breaks in the clouds. When the sun did return, people posted photos on social media with a combination of joy and relief. That experience hints at the effect Jesus had on St. Paul and the early Christians. As he writes, "You were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord." Today, just as then, Jesus brings light and healing to the darkness within us and within our world. Unlike the elusive sun, we can see the light of Jesus every day – in the people we love, the kindness of strangers, moments of prayer, unexpected joys. In turn, St. Paul encourages us to "live as children of light" by being the face of Jesus to others.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Even in the midst of Lent as a penitential season, the Sunday readings offer us much hope. Consider today's familiar story of Jesus healing the blind man. He doesn't just tell the man to open his eyes. Instead, Jesus smears clay on the man's eyes and has him wash in the Pool of Siloam; only then does the blind man see. He was transformed through Christ. Through our baptism we, too, have been transformed and "enlightened," becoming sons and daughters of light (ccc 1216). As we continue to observe Lent, perhaps we're working on areas in our life where we have been spiritually blind – or at least not seeing 20/20. Through our baptism and the sacraments, we can be healed and transformed by Jesus, the "light of the world." In turn we can share that light with others, as we continue to grow in the virtues of "goodness and righteousness and truth" of which St. Paul speaks.

PRAY Psalm 23 is a favorite of many and for good reason. Read or listen to it this week as encouragement on your Lenten journey:

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. In verdant pastures he gives me repose; beside restful waters he leads me; he refreshes my soul.
