A **NOVENA** to the **HOLY SPIRIT** begins on Friday May 19 and continues through Saturday May 27. A novena (from Latin: *novem*, "nine") is an ancient tradition of devotional praying in Christianity, consisting of private or public prayers repeated for nine successive days or weeks. The nine days between the Ascension of Jesus and Pentecost Sunday, when the disciples gathered in the upper room and devoted themselves to prayer, is often considered to be the first novena.

You are invited and encouraged to pray with other Blessed Sacrament parishioners for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon us all. Here are three ways to participate:

Creation Care Recipe of the Month-May



Maple Nut Granola

A tasty breakfast snack, serve with (plant-based) milk or yogurt.

Ingredients

- 2 Tbsp flaxmeal
- 1/2 cup maple syrup
- 2 Tbsp oil
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp ground nutmeg
- 2 cups oats
- 1/2 cup pecans or walnuts
- Pinch of salt
- 1/2 cup golden raisins

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 325°F.
2. In a medium bowl, whisk the flaxmeal with the maple syrup. Allow to sit for a few minutes, then whisk again until flax becomes sticky. Add the oil and spices and mix thoroughly. Add the oats, nuts, and salt and toss to coat completely.
3. Spread granola on a parchment-lined tray and bake 15-20 minutes. Allow to cool on pan. Toss in the golden raisins and store in an airtight container.

Enjoy with milk or sprinkled over yogurt and fresh fruit. Consider trying with non-dairy milks and yogurts. 8 servings.

Eating "lower on the food chain" is a powerful way to answer Pope Francis' call to Care for Creation.

Why? It can help reduce the amount of water, land, energy, chemicals, transportation, refrigeration and packaging we use. It can also help reduce stress on our livestock and its handlers, lower grocery bills, improve personal health, and keep us in solidarity with people with less means.

How to do it? Choose ingredients that are in-season, organic, locally grown, with simple or no packaging, and contain no meat and little dairy.

Praise Be to God for His generosity — the soil and water, plants and animals that sustain us, and for the farmers who labor. Bon appétit!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I know a few people whose method of book buying is to read the last few pages of a book first. They want to know if buying, or reading, the book is going to be worth it. As an avid bibliophile I find this to be something I could never do, but I understand their impulse. After all, it makes sense to want to have some kind of assurance that the journey one is taking – whether physical, spiritual, or literary – has a decent “payoff,” as it were. In today’s Gospel, Jesus promises his disciples that when he leaves he will provide “another Advocate” for them. We see this truth in action in the first reading, as with the laying on of hands by the apostles, those who had been baptized in Jesus’ name “received the Holy Spirit.” Christ’s life, death, and resurrection not only conquered death and brought us new life, it made way for the Holy Spirit who has come to dwell among and within us. The Lord has not left us alone. So while we may have a sense of what the sequel to our journey is, we trust the author of our story to help us write the ending of this one.

STUDY In order to truly live the Word and spread it to others as Jesus commanded, we must be familiar with the Scriptures. The *Word on Fire Bible*, featuring the Gospels only, is well-designed and includes commentary from Bishop Robert Barron as well as Church Fathers and recent saints and Catholic authors.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The love of God and the gift of faith from the Holy Spirit brought the earliest disciples, and us, to the journey – to our own story of a life of discipleship. And while the Bible is indeed “a book,” it is also a compilation of books, letters, and events, and more, that give words to a living history of salvation that began before time and is outside of time and eternal. The Good News cannot be contained in pages – it must be lived, shared, and loved. And yes, it is good to know how it ends, but even that pales in relation to the joy and worthiness of the reading and living of the Word. That is for us to experience, and to share! As much gratification as there is in sharing our favorite new bestseller, we need to double and revamp our efforts when it comes to the Gospel. Give it away freely, to everyone, and shout out the ending. Jesus Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! And the Holy Spirit sets us free to love him and one another.

May 18th St. Baldrick's Head Shaving Fundraiser

In 2016, we started the annual celebrating 25-year St Baldricks head shaving fundraiser at TOPS OFF BARBERS in downtown Charleston. In the 7 events we have held to date, we have raised over \$160,000. These funds have been raised by volunteers shaving and soliciting donations to support childhood cancer research. Our 8th event will be held again at TOPS OFF on Thursday May 18, 2023, during the ARTWALK event in Charleston.

One point I would like to make to all in my network. In 2020, with many events cancelled and/or postponed, you stepped up to the table and donated the greatest amount of our events. In 2020, we raised over \$38 thousand dollars. We need to continue that support since national donations remain down.

When we started our efforts in Charleston, the numbers above were 35 kids each day diagnosed and 7 dying. So although the survival rate is going down the number of deaths remains the same. We are making progress but we need to continue our efforts.

How can you help?

2. Join us as volunteers or shavees and help us to raise awareness and funds.
3. Join us at TOPS OFF on May 18 to show support for the shavees and barbers for their efforts.

The Mass

In this course we will examine the core principles of the Eucharistic liturgy as found in the foundational documents of the Mass. We will consider its history and make connections between the modern liturgy and the historical context. Our central point of discussion throughout the course will be focused on the celebration of the Paschal Mystery. Over the course of the five weeks, we will take a deep dive into the elements of the Sunday celebration and its component parts. This course will be of value for liturgical ministers, RCIA Team members, and anyone interested in learning more about this most central celebration of all the baptized. All course materials are online, and we will meet for class lecture/discussion once a week on Tuesday evenings 7-9 pm beginning May 23rd

Images of Jesus

Through this course the participant will have the opportunity to examine, from a variety of theological perspectives, what we know and believe about the central figure of the Christian faith and arguably the most influential person who ever walked the earth. After looking at many different resources, the student will be able to form a personal answer to "Who do you say that I am?"

We will look at the images of Jesus in the New Testament, as understood in theology today, as understood in the Paschal Mystery and as encountered in the liturgical life of the Church. All course materials are online and we will meet for class lecture/discussion once a week on Wednesday evenings 7-9 pm beginning May 24th. This course is part of the sequence for the catechetical certification.
