Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I hope this letter finds you in good spirits and filled with the peace of our Lord. I am writing to share with you an exciting initiative that promises to shape our diocese in meaningful ways: a partnership with the Catholic Leadership Institute (CLI), a distinguished national apostolate that has dedicated more than 30 years to nurturing and supporting the Church's leaders. This collaboration offers us a notable opportunity to engage deeply in programs and action steps designed to create a three-year evangelization plan for our diocese.

A key component of this partnership will be the implementation of the Disciple Maker Index, a parish survey tool that has successfully gathered the voices and experiences of over 600,000 parishioners across more than 40 dioceses in the United States since its inception in 2013. What I find particularly compelling about the Disciple Maker Index is that it invites you—the faithful of our Diocese—to reflect on where you are in your journey of faith, both as disciples and as missionaries. I know the Diocese has offered different surveys in the past, and we recently completed a Synod process, but please know your feedback in the Disciple Maker Index will be invaluable in helping us understand how we can better serve each of you and our wider community.

In addition to the Disciple Maker Index, all active priests in our Diocese will reflect on their leadership and seek opportunities for growth through the Priest Leadership Inventory, a comprehensive assessment designed to foster individual development within our clergy. This self-reflection will lead to the creation of personalized growth plans, with support available from trained leadership coaches provided by CLI.

Throughout this initiative, we will also be gathering additional insights through one-on-one interviews with a small number of parishioners, engaging focus groups, and undertaking an envisioning process with CLI. This comprehensive approach will allow us to gather diverse perspectives and ensure that the final outcomes resonate with our entire diocesan family. This work will conclude by August 2025.

I am excited about the potential fruits of these tools and initiatives. As we begin this process, I want you to specifically understand that I am not commissioning this project to close parishes. This is an effort to revitalize and grow our Catholic community in this Diocese. Even if our state is losing population, our Church can grow if we make a determined effort, through prayer and action, to reach out to our absent Catholics and to the many West Virginians with no religious affiliation. To that end, I am asking you to join me in this effort, and I have a specific request for you.

As a part of the process, each parish will assign a parish point of contact person who will be the liaison between the parish and the Catholic Leadership Institute as well as spearhead the sharing of information about the Disciple Maker Index process. Please prayerfully consider if this is a role you are being called to and, if it is, please inform your Pastor no later than Friday, November 1, 2024.

Thank you for your continued commitment to our Diocese as we strive to answer the Lord's call to evangelize all peoples. Together, through this partnership with the Catholic Leadership Institute, let us strive to grow as a vibrant and active community of disciples, living out our call to evangelize and serve Christ and our world.

National Vocation Awareness Week, celebrated November 3-9, 2024, is an annual

week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promoting vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, and consecrated life through prayer and education, and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. NVAW began in 1976 when the U. S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for NVAW. In 1997, this celebration was moved to coincide with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which falls on January 13 in 2013. Beginning in 2014, NVAW was moved to the first full week of November.



Why I am Still Catholic # 4

I remember a few years ago a priest friend asked me—over pizza—how did I stay in the Church? I admit he had heard me rant more than once about issues and responses from institutional church leadership. My friend had just returned from a men's retreat in the New Mexico desert so I don't know if he was asking me as an assignment from the retreat or out of his own curiosity, but what I do remember is how I struggled to answer his question. And now I am faced with answering this question again.

At Mass on the Feast of St. James this year, the first two readings really spoke to me as I contemplated what keeps me rooted in my Catholic faith. The first reading from Isaiah spoke about the Spirit of God being upon "me" and the second reading reminded us that we are all earthen vessels. These readings gave me hope. I know I am an earthen vessel—cracked, broken, patched. I also know I have been graced to experience the Spirit of God within.

My rational brain would not allow me to stay in this very human work of God, this Church as we know it; but the gift of faith, of being called and formed by God and experiencing the fullness and richness of the Catholic community keep me rooted as a Catholic.

I would describe my spiritual life, my relationship to God as both personal and communal. My personal prayer is formed, informed, impacted, made deeper and fuller by sharing prayer and Eucharist, by challenging homilies, by inspired spirit-filled leadership, by friendships with those who journey and pray with me, by our call to take these prayer experiences to the larger community and through outreach ministry and my daily work.

In my volunteer ministry at St. James and in my daily work, I have often found community, prayer and Eucharist. We often don't name it in this way but on reflection I know I can see it and feel it and this is what I believe God wants us to be about.

I personally need the support of the people of God, the Communion of Saints, the Servant Church, the sacramental life and our Catholic imagination. These all call me to prayer and keep me rooted.

And besides all this the fact is that for me I can't imagine any other way to live than as a searching, patched, very human Catholic.

So, what keeps you rooted as a Catholic? Try answering the question... for me this has been a positive and reflective experience... and has forced me to pause and identify why I stay.

Blessed Sacrament Weekly Email - October 18, 2024

For a number of years now, a frequently asked and always dreaded question in parish life every December is "What time is midnight Mass?" Even before 2011 when *Midnight Mass* officially changed to *Mass at Nigh*t in the Roman Missal, many parishes including Saint Peter's in Rome & our Co-Cathedrals began this celebration at 10:30 pm.

This news is unwelcome by some, but no surprise to many. Blessed Sacrament Parish will no longer have Christmas Midnight Mass. The decision to drop the Midnight Mass was discussed at Staff, Liturgy Committee, and Pastoral Council meetings. The fact is that Midnight Mass has disappeared from many, if not most parish churches due to the reality that Catholics have clearly indicated they prefer to worship on Christmas Eve the late afternoon, early evening, or Christmas morning. Here is a summary of the discussions that took place, but I learned long ago *Reason doesn't matter when it is an affair of the heart*. Nevertheless . . .

Even before Covid, the attendance here at Blessed Sacrament's Midnight Mass was growing steadily less. The attendance post-Covid has been only about 45.

About half of those present were there because of one of our several Liturgical Ministries: reader, server, Eucharist, greeter/usher, cantor, choir member, and musician. It seems that the overwhelming majority of folks have chosen other Masses.

It is a more prudent use of our Vocal Choir and ministers to serve at another Christmas Mass. Besides, a mostly empty church with a few non-ministerial parishioners widely scattered would appear to be sad to many people

There is an overwhelming consensus by the Liturgy Committee, Pastoral Council, and Staff that our parish will be better served by pouring our energies into joyful celebrations <u>at 4:00pm</u> and <u>7:00pm</u> on Christmas Eve and <u>at 10:00am</u> on Christmas morning. I understand why some parishioners will be disappointed and we will provide information of any local parish with a midnight Mass.

Will Rogers (1879-1935)

My all-time favorite journalist was Will Rogers, the great Native-American humorist who was loved by both conservatives and liberals. This grinning, biracial, Cherokee Indian cowboy from Oklahoma kept our nation laughing through the depths of the Great Depression of the 1930s.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt said, "Will Rogers held the secret of banishing gloom, of making tears give way to laughter, of supplanting desolation and despair with hope and courage."

Politicians from both parties invited Rogers to run for President on their ticket, but he refused.

Raised a Methodist, he was ecumenical in his respect for all faith traditions. He advised: "Hunt out and talk about the good that is in the other fellow's church, and you will do away with all the religious hatred you hear so much of today." Rogers was a peacemaker, a healer.

When Rogers died in 1935 in an airplane crash, the entire nation mourned. Over 100,000 mourners walked by Roger's casket at his ecumenical funeral. His memorial

service was presided over by a Protestant minister, a Catholic priest, and a Jewish singer who sang a Hebrew mourning chant. Mexican-Americans nearby placed a memorial wreath in their neighborhood. An African-American group joined a parade in Rogers' honor. In Oklahoma, Cherokee Indians performed a death dance in his honor.

Will Rogers had a loving heart, He was fair-minded, He never became obsessed with the bad news of his times. He had credibility with the American people. "We will never have true civilization until we have learned to recognize the rights of others," Rogers said.

Rogers requested that the following epitaph appear on his gravestone: "I joked about every prominent man of my time, but I never met a man I didn't like."

In these tumultuous times, we could all learn from Will Rogers. He was a sane and believable voice who had a talent for bringing people together.
