# October 5 - Virtus Certification in Person Training

<u>All</u> Blessed Sacrament volunteers must be compliant with Virtus Certification requirements. There are two parts to this:

- 1. Have a current (within the last 3 years) background check. (Violent crimes and crimes involving children are the only results only one person will see at our diocese.)
- 2. Learn how to be a guardian for children and vulnerable adults. Training videos will help you recognize "grooming" techniques predators use, how to report suspicious behavior, how to recognize depression in children (which could be a result of abuse), etc.

This will take about 1.5 hours and there will be snacks!

If you don't have time this Thursday, or you would just prefer to do this on your own, let Natalie know and she will send you relatively easy directions to follow to become Virtus certified/compliant online.





#### **MYSTIC MORSELS**

Saint Therese of Lisieux (1873-1987)

You cannot be half a saint; you must be a whole saint or no saint at all.

For me prayer is a surge of the heart, it is a simple look towards Heaven, it is a cry of recognition and of love, embracing both trial and joy.

Jesus has shown me the only way that leads to the fire of divine love: it is that of a little child who, full of trust, falls asleep in his Father's arms.

STORY: I hired a carpenter to help me restore an old farmhouse. After he had just finished a rough first day on the job, a flat tire made him lose an hour of work, his electric saw quit, and now his ancient pickup truck refused to start. While I drove him home, he sat in stone silence. On arriving, he invited me in to meet his family. As we walked toward the front door, he paused briefly at a small tree, touching the tips of the branches with both hands. When opening the door, he underwent an amazing transformation. His tanned face was wreathed in smiles, and he hugged his two small children and gave his wife a kiss.

Afterward, he walked me to the car. We passed the tree and my curiosity got the better of me. I asked him about what I had seen him do earlier. "Oh, that's my trouble tree," he replied. "I know I can't help having troubles on the job, but one thing's for sure, troubles don't belong in the house with my wife and the children. So I just hang them up on the tree every night when I come home. Then in the morning I pick them up again." "Funny thing is," he smiled, "when I come out in the morning to pick them up, there aren't nearly as many as I remember hanging up the night before."

# SAINT OF THE WEEK: Saint Thérèse of Lisieux (1873-1897) October 1



Saint Thérèse of Lisieux was a young Carmelite Sister who died at the age of 24. She said: "I will spend my time in heaven doing good on earth." Today is her feast day. Thérèse was aware that most of us will never achieve anything great or be well- known. Her "little way" (as she called it) was to choose to live in a loving way her ordinary daily life, no matter how monotonous it might be. When somebody was annoying her, Thérèse set out to think of that person's qualities and good intentions. "You've always got a smile for me," remarked someone who, in fact, always irritated her! "My vocation, my calling," Thérèse said "is to love." Whatever was frustrating and annoying in daily life she offered to God to be transformed into something good for other

people.

Thérèse said: "Love can do all things. Our Lord does not look so much at the greatness of our actions - or even at their difficulty - as at the love with which we do them." She was often ill - and she would die of tuberculosis when she was only 24. She realized that, as quiet and hidden suffering and sacrifice is offered to God, it is transformed into being of help to other people. "My little way," she wrote "is the way of childhood - the way of trust and absolute self-surrender. In my little way, everything is most ordinary. Jesus will transform us."

# GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I used to be something of a sugar fiend. So much so that one birthday, my then boyfriend (now husband) decided to forego flowers and bought me a jumbo-sized bag of Smarties candies instead. While I loved sugar, I eventually decided I didn't love how it made me feel. Now older and wiser, I reach for vegetables more often. It's not that I crave carrots, but I feel better eating healthy foods. It's what God intends for my body. Similarly, God intends for our souls to follow the laws he has ordained. But sometimes life gets tough and we suffer terrible wrongs or are grieving, and we feel like the Israelites in today's first reading, calling out, "The Lord's way is not fair!" Well, thank God for that! How lost would we be, if God treated us "fairly." Instead, he treats us with love and mercy; with justice. "He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross," for us. If there is any encouragement in Christ, as Paul says, and we know there is, then being of the same mind and heart - attitude - of Christ, gets us through those moments of "unfair!" And we can follow Christ's commands, knowing he loves us more than anyone else could love us, and more than we can ever love him.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It's easy to talk a good game as Christians. We can all agree that it is right to feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, clothe the naked, visit the sick and imprisoned and bury the dead, as the Corporal Works of Mercy instruct us. But when it comes to actually doing those things – "humbly regard[ing] others as more important than [ourselves], each looking out not for his own interests, but also for those of others" – we can find all sorts of reasons not to. Maybe our days are too busy or maybe we feel just the tiniest bit resentful at the idea of sharing something we've worked hard to earn. However, our words don't mean much without action. Jesus says as much in today's Gospel. If we are like the son who says yes but then does not go to work in the vineyard, we are not doing our Father's will. We are like the chief priests who are being bypassed on the way to heaven by "tax collectors and prostitutes" who heard the word of God and believed.

**PRAY** This week, let us look for ways to live out our faith. Rather than pray only with our words, let us pray with our actions. If you aren't sure where to start, pay special consideration to the verses from the second reading, highlighted above: "Do nothing out of selfishness or out of vainglory; rather, humbly regard others as more important than yourselves, each looking out not for his own interests, but also for those of others."
