Robert Louis Stevenson was born in Edinburgh, Scotland in 1850. He is best known for writing 'Treasure Island', 'Kidnapped 'and 'The Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde.' He is less well known for what he called his Patterns for Living. Here are the first six of twelve. They were good words of advice then that ring just as true today.

- Make up your mind to be happy. Learn to find pleasure in simple things.
- Make the best of circumstances. No one has everything and everyone has something of sorrow.
- Don't take yourself too seriously.
- Don't let criticism worry you. You can't please everybody.
- Don't let your neighbors set your standards; be yourself.
- Do things you enjoy doing but stay out of debt.

Would that someone told me about this in my early twenties! I can't say for sure that I would have listened. But I do know I would have saved myself (and others) a lot of grief. Which one do you think has been or can be most important to you?
