OCIA INQUIRY GROUP BEGINS

Tertullian, a second century Christian, observed, "Christians are made, not born." What he was trying to say was that the Church cannot simply baptize people without preparing them to live the Christian life. They need to be prepared to "live a life worthy of the calling you have received" in Christ. (Ephesians 4:1) The purpose of an Inquiry Group is to help those considering entering into full communion to understand the basics of what the Catholic Church teaches and why. The Inquiry Class goals are to guide each interested person to understand and discern whether God is calling him or her how the Catholic Way, Truth, and Sacramental Life of the Catholic Church. This group has at least two important goals:

- 1. to help people who have never been baptized and those people already baptized in another Christian Church to understand what makes Catholics catholic.
- 2. to help participants grow closer to God as they prepare for possible initiation into the Roman Catholic Church and enable them to live out their faith as Catholics.

SAINT OF THE WEEK:

Saint Gregory the Great

September 3

Saint Gregory the Great is a central figure of the medieval western Church and one of the most admired Popes in history. Born near the middle of the sixth century into a noble Roman family, Gregory received a classical education in liberal arts and the law. He also had strong religious formation from his devout family, particularly from his mother, Silvia, also a canonized saint. By around age 30, Gregory had advanced to high political office in Rome, during what was nevertheless a period of marked decline for the city.

Some time after becoming the prefect of the former imperial capital, Gregory chose to leave the civil administration to become a monk during the rise of the Benedictine order. In reality, however, the new monk's great career in public life was yet to come. After three years of strict monastic life, he was called personally by the Pope to assume the office of a deacon in Rome. From Rome, he was dispatched to Constantinople, to seek aid from the emperor for Rome's civic troubles, and to aid in resolving the Eastern church's theological controversies. He returned to Rome in 586, after six years of service as the Papal representative to the eastern Church and empire.

Rome faced a series of disasters caused by flooding in 589, followed by the death of Pope Pelagius II the next year. Gregory, then serving as abbot in a monastery, reluctantly accepted his election to replace him as the Bishop of Rome. Despite this initial reluctance, however, Pope Gregory began working tirelessly to reform and solidify the Roman liturgy, the disciplines of the Church, the military and economic security of Rome, and the Church's spreading influence in western Europe. . .

In undertaking these works, Pope Gregory saw himself as the "servant of the servants of God." He was the first of the Bishops of Rome to popularize the now-traditional Papal title, which referred to Christ's command that those in the highest position of leadership should be "the last of all and the servant of all." Even as he undertook to consolidate Papal power and shore up the crumbling Roman west, St. Gregory the Great maintained a humble sense of his mission as a servant and pastor of souls, from the time of his election until his death in 604.

Spiritual Icebreakers and Soup Starters 115

Icebreakers give us something to talk about. Soup starters make for a good beginning. Here is some spiritual kindling to use, think about, and pray with this week.

The greatest library in the ancient world is said to have been the one in Alexandria, Egypt. Sadly, it burnt to the ground. There is a legend about the only scroll to have survived the fire. A man bought the scroll in a bazaar and read what at first seemed like a boring manuscript. Then he read a remarkable story at the end. It told of a certain touchstone which had two remarkable qualities. First, it was warm to the touch no matter how cold it was outside. Second, whenever someone touched another object with the touchstone, that object would turn to gold. Alas, the stone was lost somewhere upon the shore of the Black Sea.

The man rejoiced in his discovery, sold everything he had, and moved to the Black Sea. Every day he would go to the shore, pickup up a rock, feel it, and throw it back into the sea if it was cold. Hour after hour, day after day, week after week, month after month, year after year he would pick up a stone, grasp it in his fist, and, if it was cold, toss it into the water. Finally, one day, he picked up a stone, felt that it was warm to the touch, and — out of sheer force of habit — threw it into the sea.

Today's gospel would seem to be much ado about nothing. After all everyone *knows* you should wash your hands before eating and that dishes should be clean before cooking. Actually, what is at issue is religious devotions or practices. Jesus warned people of the danger of confusing *holiness* with religious practices.

There are at least four reasons why religious practices such as saying prayers, praying the rosary, reading the Bible or going to Mass do not *guarantee* holiness.

- First, one might be doing them for the wrong reasons (e.g., to be noticed);
- Second, as the story suggests, one might just be going through the motions.
- Next, one might have a lack of understanding about why we do what we do when we do something religious (e.g., holy water or lighting candles);
- Fourth, religious practices can distract us from what is truly important as the Letter of James stresses (to care for orphans and widows in their affliction), and other corporal and spiritual works of mercy.
- + Finally, one might be doing the practices carelessly (sign of the cross).

So today's gospel reminds us that religious practices and devotions are important providing we

- + do the right things;
- for the right reasons;
- + in the right ways.
